It's finally here, Allstars weekend 2023!

I'd like to start by saying being Captain of the Barbarians team this year has been such an honor. Being a part of an incredible team of people, not just the Barbarians team but the team of captains, has been a fantastic experience.

This year, we have been fundraising for 17 charities across the UK. We're seeing the return of Blue Cross to Allstars in 2023. Keith Hinde is representing them for the third time and he says this time is particularly important as "a boom in pet acquisition during lockdown has become a tsunami of pet abandonment during the cost of living crisis, pushing animal welfare organisations to their limits."

Paul Wright is supporting 2Wish which provides bereavement support for families who have traumatically lost a child or young adult. The charity was set up by Paul's neighbour Rhian Mannings after suddenly losing her one-year-old son and husband within five days of each other. Tragedy also

hit Paul's family when his brother found his 17-year-old son, Joseph, dead a week before Christmas during lockdown.

Netminder Tim Coe is playing for Treetops Hospice, a Derbyshire based charity providing nursing care and emotional support for anyone affected by a life-limiting illness or bereavement. He says, "My family connection to Treetops Hospice goes back to its initial founding 40 years ago. My grandparents, Jean and Fergus Anderson, volunteered from the beginning of Treetops' journey, and it was a big part of our family life growing up."

Over the last few months, our players have been doing the weird and wonderful as part of their fundraising efforts from running the Cardiff Half Marathon in full kit, quiz nights, gin nights, and raffles to placing bets in Las Vegas!

All the players and off ice fundraisers, not just from team Barbarians but everyone involved in Allstars weekend, have put in an incredible effort over the last few months. Now let's enjoy some hockey!

Though tenuous, my link to All Stars is well established. Mine and Dave's on ice handbag fight at All Stars 2008 in Basingstoke is one of those things that reappears in Facebook memories and social media posts from time to time. I'm also probably one of the most prolific writers about the sport in the country at this point and I've known Dave since 2006. It's not an unreasonable thing to ask of me to write for this. After all, you don't keep a dog and bark yourself.

Then the next part of the message thread came through.

"We're trying to be organised for once"

That line struck me. As I was stood there in my kitchen re-reading it, tea brewing behind me to the soundtrack of my son practicing being a Power Ranger, I couldn't help but feel that in that one sentence, my old friend has sold himself and his cohorts incredibly short.

There is a very real chance that by the end of the year, perhaps even by the time this article makes it to print that All Stars will have surpassed having raised £1 million. Stop and think about that for a moment. Whilst £1million is about a month's wages for a half decent footballer or the cost of 3 sets of branded bedding and a teddy bear from the Sheffield Steelers' merchandise shop, for most people like you and I, that's a lot of money.

It's also not just a lot of money dumped in a pile as Dave, Gareth and their helpers wave high the flag of self-praise. That's money to organisations that have done and are doing important work on the ground for people that you know and love. It's money to causes like cancer research, heart disease research and mental health support. It's not money wasted on a fad or the next big restructuring or a chucked down a hole, it's money that's been put to good use.

I get why it might feel like things are disorganised when it comes to All Stars. Any weekend like this has a moving part for every pound it raises. It can be a bit chaotic but at the end of the day it's a ton of fun and I think that's why All Stars as a weekend has continued for as long as it has. All Stars has, what I believe to be one of the key components of life that sometimes British hockey lacks. It takes what it does seriously without taking itself too seriously.

One of my personal bugbears with British hockey is that at times it seems people watching it, playing it and running it forget that at its base, hockey is a game. It's meant to be fun. Yes, that tension and drama is part of it. Yes, I preach a lot that hockey cannot exist in a vacuum from the politics of the day. Yes, the sport needs to be run professionally and to benefit the whole sport; OF COURSE, THE ELITE LEAGUE HAS A RESPONSIBILITY TO DEVELOP PLAYERS *cough* sorry, where was I?

However, at times it feels that people are too quick to be defensive about stuff. Something goes wrong, someone says it, it's taken as a personal attack rather than being a reasoned critique. Don't get me wrong, some people on the internet try to argue with all the nuance of a breeze block thrown at a greenhouse but too often rather than realising that someone has a point, people pushback because they can't fathom being seen to not be right.

If I've learned anything from the folk involved with this event is when stuff doesn't work, they change it. When people have good ideas, they take it on. They've tried to keep this event well run and fun.

It's never going to rival the Stanley Cup for quality but reader you have the sport you love at your fingertips run in the right spirit and raising money to help people who need the help. The fact that this event is close to raising £1million isn't just a testament of hard work, but that hard work is the best work.

I wish everyone a fantastic weekend. Skate hard, play hard, at least pretend to drink responsibly and remember that if something doesn't go the way it planned in the next couple of days that it doesn't matter; it's just a bit of fun.

To my beautiful friends and family, I love you so much, thank you for always being there for me.


